Mayor Quaiff and Council - first congratulations on getting through your first 4 months and still reflecting an impressive "working team" on our behalf as citizens. At least I am impressed!

After 10 years of sitting in this horseshoe, I realize there is a lovely life outside of politics so you won't see me here much unless I have a burning interest in a topic. The one on the agenda for this Special Council meeting has been and will remain a "button pusher" for me.

First I have to say that if a Councillor hadn't given me the heads up about this meeting just a week ago , I still might not know anything about it. Given its content and history with various Councils and citizens, I think it deserved some print media advertising or at least a press release and if that meant holding up this meeting for a week more, so be it. This is not a good start to this discussion.

Secondly, this topic is on the "short term goal" list for this Council as I understand it. Given it has been through 3 other Councils without the structure being changed, one might take warning that it's not the "short term" that has created the issues before but rather the long term "actualization" of the proposed other options, including the one before you from Mayor Quaiff today. Each of these has potential long term impact elements for democracy, citizen input and engagement, and our culture - both past and present, and our taxes.

If you are a new Councillor or an old Councillor, each of you on this "new" team owe it to yourselves and us to put on your "own" glasses and look at all the proposals for change, including those yet to be solicited in my opinion - AND also look at the current structure. There was a minimum of 150 years of municipal experience (50 Council members x 3 years) that decided this current structure back at the time of amalgamation. The last term of Council were prepared to put their decision out to a citizen group with 69 collective "days" experience.

This is a tough topic and it deserves public input - well planned opportunities for public input. That's how it was done in 1996 by a group of Councillors who knew their communities of interest well. It also deserves "brainstorming" - a no holds barred approach to considering how else we might get our island governance done. I also think a critical look at the current structure is necessary. Is there a way to get more "capacity" out of this current model of 16? This has never been explored. Never considered. I think collectively developing a Councillor job description with performance standards would be a start. Why aren't ALL Councillors required to hold a Town Hall meeting at least twice a year? What was the thinking and feeling back when 16 was decided as the number? NO, don't just take someone's word for it because they've been on council since amalgamation. I've heard several stories over the years so I looked back at the newspapers of the day. I encourage you to do the same. I have one page as a sample for you today - the headline is telling on its own..

It will start from this meeting. Some of you will likely be "bullied" for your position - in person and/or in print. Some will seek trade-offs to get the vote they want from you. That's politics and it can have its merits. But the one thing that can surely start at this meeting is the "erosion" of this brand new team. That would be a shame and I personally don't believe this topic has that much merit. You have good things to do for this County; you have important things to do for this County. If you're going to tackle this, please plan the process well.

Take time to thoroughly "visualize" and articulate the outcome. "Except for the elections, everything will stay the same." Tell me what that will look like. And if everything will stay the same, why this exercise. The defense of the structure determined at amalgamation met the Provincial government's test for representation. I don't believe that has changed.

Please put this template over the situation before you:

"Let's get this done. The people want it. Sounds good. We'll look like we're doing something good and progressive - responding with change. We'll save money. We'll operate more effectively. Nothing will change in communities. People will still get the same service. We'll figure out the details later."

It was all business for Prince Edward County Council's 13 members Tuesday, when they narrowly voted 7-6 in Jayour of a one tier re-tructuring option.

However, the County must now waitsuntil Tuesday when each municipality will hold a ratification vote on the one fier option, to find out whether or not the decision can be forwarded to Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister Al Feach. Of the municipalities who vote to accept the one tier option, their total combined population must be 50 per cent plus one of the County off to address each of fl population to win the triple majority - before calling for a vote.

Sophiasburgh Reeve Fred Campbell told council he really hadn't made up his mind, noting that he believes council has not allotted enough time to truly examine the three options.

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
