**Jonathan Rose** is Associate Professor of Political Studies at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario and Educator in Residence, Centre for Teaching & Learning, Queen's University. From 2006-07 he was the Academic Director of the Ontario Citizens' Assembly on Electoral Reform the first such body in Ontario and second in the world.

Jonathan has taught courses in New York, Japan, the, UK and most recently the Czech Republic. In 2008 Jonathan was a Visiting Research Fellow at Victoria University of Wellington where he lectured on citizen engagement and the power of citizens' assemblies.

He has written, co-written and edited four books and a number of articles both in the scholarly and popular press. He is a member of the Advertising Review Panel for the Auditor General of Ontario, a board that enforces legislation regulating government advertising in Ontario. His most recent book, co-written with other colleagues, examines citizens' assemblies in BC, Ontario and the Netherlands and is called *When Citizens Decide: Lessons from Citizens' Assemblies on Electoral Reform* (London: Oxford 2011).
