Legislative Background

The Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 (AODA) was enacted to develop and enforce accessibility standards in order to achieve accessibility for Ontarians with disabilities with respect to goods, services, facilities, accommodation, employment, buildings, structures, premises and transportation throughout Ontario by the year 2025. The Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation of the AODA sets out the minimum accessibility requirements that an organization must meet in order to prevent and remove barriers.

Our Commitment

The Corporation of the County of Prince Edward (the "County") is committed to ensuring equal access and participation for people with disabilities. We are committed to treating people with disabilities in a way that allows them to maintain their dignity and independence.

We believe in integration, and we are committed to meeting the needs of people with disabilities in a timely manner. We will do so by removing and preventing barriers to accessibility and by meeting our accessibility requirements under Ontario's accessibility laws.

Accessibility Advisory Committee

The Prince Edward County Accessibility Advisory Committee (hereafter the "Committee") advises Council and County Staff on ways to identify, prevent and remove barriers for people with disabilities in County services, programs, and facilities. Members of the Committee are appointed by Council; who seek the advice of the Committee in matters of accessibility.

The duties and functions of the Committee are to:

- Identify changing needs, bring forward, and recommend appropriate ways to deal with issues relating to accessibility
- Work with County Staff to develop, review, and recommend to Council ways to create a barrier-free environment
- Advise Council on accessibility matters for person with disabilities to buildings, structures or premises
- Review site-plans as provided and provide input and suggestions on potential accessibility issues
- Liaise with stakeholder groups on accessibility issues
- · Conduct research on accessibility issues

Introduction

The Corporation of the County of Prince Edward strives to meet the needs of its employees, residents, visitors and customers with disabilities and is working hard to remove and prevent barriers to accessibility.

The County is committed to fulfilling our requirements under the *Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act.* This Accessibility Plan outlines the steps the County is taking to meet those requirements, and the role that the County will play in making Ontario an accessible place for all.

Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation

The Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation (IASR) established mandatory accessibility standards in four main areas: Information and Communication, Employment, Procurement, Transportation and Design of Public Spaces.



Corporate Accomplishments

During the 2017-2021 Multi-Year Accessibility Plan period, several aspects of the County's commitment to accessibility underwent improvements to remove barriers identified in the Barrier Removal section. Some of these accomplishments include:

- A new municipal website to comply with the IASR
- Internal review process put in place for all site-plan applications to ensure accessibility is considered
- Training for applicable staff on accessible document creation and report writing
- Conducted an accessibility survey among County staff and residents

Worked on creating the 2022-2026 Multi-Year Accessibility Plan

Barrier Identification

The intent of the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan is to remove barriers and obstacles that stand in the way of a persons with disabilities from being able to access services, facilities, and information. A barrier is anything that prevents a person with a disability from fully participating in all aspects of society.

Environmental Barriers: Buildings or spaces that impede physical Access

Communication Barriers: Obstacles with processing or interpreting information

Attitudinal Barriers: Assumptions that either directly or indirectly discriminate

Technological Barriers: Occurs when technology cannot support various assistive device and/or software

Systemic Barriers: Exist within an organization's policies, practice and procedures

Customer Service

The County will continue to ensure that its processes for receiving and responding to feedback are made available to persons with disabilities, whether members of the

public, clients, customers or employees, in an appropriate, accessible format or communication support, upon request, and that members of the public are notified of the availability of such an option.

The County will also continue to:

- Provide notice of temporary disruptions to goods, services or facilities; and
- Provide a copy of any document in an accessible format as requires under the Customer Service Standards.



Information and Communications

The County will continue to communicate with people with disabilities in ways that consider their disability. When asked, we will provide information about our organization

and its services, including public safety information, in accessible formats or with communication supports.

The County will ensure that website(s) and content form with the World Wide Web Consortium Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0, initially at Level AA and increasing to Level AAA per the timelines outlined in the IASR.

Employment

The County will continue to notify employees, potential hires and the pubic that accommodation can be made during recruitment and hiring. Employees will be notified that supports are available for those with disabilities, and that individual accommodation plans can be developed.

The County's performance management, career development and redeployment processes will consider the accessibility needs of all employees. The County will continue to:

- Upon request, provide individualized workplace emergency response information to employees; and
- Practice a return to work process and the provision of individual accommodation plans.

Training

The County is committed to training staff and volunteers in Ontario's accessibility laws and aspects of the *Ontario Human Rights Code* that relate to persons with disabilities. Staff continue to receive customer service training, and on-going training will be provided to employees and volunteers on accessibility as it relates to their specific roles.

Procurement

The County will continue to incorporate accessibility criteria and features when procuring or acquiring goods, services or facilities, including self-serve kiosks. If it is not

possible and practical to do so, an explanation can be provided upon request.

Transportation

Accessible transportation systems improve mobility for those individuals who need it in the community. The County will ensure that transportation services, such as taxis, will



adhere to the requirements under the Transportation standard. County Transit is a public service that provides quick, easy, safe and affordable transportation for the residents of Prince Edward County. There is both a fixed route and an on-demand route. There is also a Specialized transit service available for individuals requiring accessible public transit in Prince Edward County. This service, contracted through Quinte Transit, provides door to door transit services to locations within Prince Edward County and beyond, four days per week (Tuesday through Friday). County Transit continues to grow and expand to meet the demand. Since the buses began rolling in August 2020, Country Transit has provided approximately 1,500 trips as well as 5,300 trips on the specialized service. The goal of ensuring the barriers that contributes to social isolation and impacts to access to employment, food and other essential services that are vital to the community are removed. This specialized service utilized by seniors and people with disabilities is vital, and its inclusion in the 2022-2026 Multi-Year accessibility plan reaffirms the municipality's commitment.

The County will continue to:

- Consult with the Accessibility Advisory Committee, the public and persons with disabilities to determine the proportion of on-demand accessible taxicabs and monitor the demand of specialized Quinte Transit services required in Prince Edward County and identify the process and steps made towards meeting that need.
- Ensure that the owners and operators of taxicabs make available vehicle registration and identification in an accessible format.
- Ensure that Quinte Transit specialized transit service make available to the public current information on accessibility equipment and features of their vehicles, routes and services.
- Assist specialized transportation service providers with accessibility training, as required.

 Receive an update of the specialized transit system (Quinte Transit) and accessible taxis, as required and assist with any program evaluation processes, as needed.

Design of Public Space

The County will ensure when constructing new or redeveloping existing public spaces, it adheres to requirements under the Design of Public Spaces in the following areas:

Recreational trails/beach access routes



- Outdoor public use eating areas
- Outdoor play spaces
- Exterior paths of travel
- Accessible parking
- Service counters and waiting areas

Multi-Year Accessibility Plan

The Multi-Year Accessibility Plan is to identify the specific requirements applicable to Prince Edward County, as mandated by the Province of Ontario through the Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation, and the measures that have been taken or will be undertaken from 2022-2026 to ensure compliance with the various regulations.



Corporate Work Plan

The Corporate Work Plan outlines the key objectives of the Accessibility Advisory Committee. The Committee will choose which of the five initiatives will be their priority for the year, and repeat this process until all five goals have been successfully completed.

The Accessibility Advisory Committee identified the following goals and initiatives as part of its 2022-2026 Committee Work Plan:

- 1. Assess and identify the need for accessibility provisions to County services with the goal of increasing participation and opportunities for persons with disabilities.
- 2. Within the community, research opportunities for grants and incentive programs for local businesses to help increase and promote accessibility.
- 3. Provide educational resources to businesses, local organizations and groups about ways to make their goods and services more accessible in various formats.
- 4. Show commitment to community engagement by ensuring all businesses and organizations providing goods and services are implementing accessible practices and create a strong sense of civic pride in doing so.
- 5. Ensure all municipal services strive to meet standards on or before the AODA compliance deadlines.

What can you do?

Whether you are a resident, visitor or an employee of a local business, we all can play a part in making The County more accessible and inclusive.

Recognize that social change begins with individual change; you can, as a resident or visitor of The County initiate change;

Evaluate your own actions and preconceived biases and ideas about accessibility and inclusion;

Educate yourself, volunteer your time and participate in activities which will broaden your experience with accessibility and inclusion;

Recognize that disabilities are not always visible – many disabilities are often not always physical in nature; encourage and support the development of programs and projects that promote holistic accessibility and inclusion;

Advocate for both the elimination of barriers and discrimination and the celebration of accessibility and diversity within your own workplace and community;

Challenge barriers and discrimination when you experience them or become aware of their existence.

Conclusion

In line with the 2022 to 2026 Multi Year Accessibility Plan, Council and staff together with the Accessibility Advisory Committee make the following commitment:

- 1. To continue implementing the AODA Integrated Accessibility Standard Regulation;
- 2. To review all unresolved issues carried forward from previous plans; and
- 3. To report to Council on an annual basis on the progress of the Plan, as well as updating the Plan, as necessary.

The Accessibility Plan is intended as a working document. Comments and recommendations will be noted throughout the upcoming year and will be reflected in annual updates to this Plan. Additional evaluation and reporting efforts include:

- Annual review of the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan and preparation of a progress report;
- Annual progress report prepared for Council to identify progress of the Plan's implementation, accomplishments and achievements; posted online and available in alternative formats upon request;
- Compliance reports submitted annually to the Province of Ontario.
